

Look out for Japanese knotweed

Flood affected regions should keep an eye out for Japanese knotweed, which favours waterways, its through its living stems, crowns or rhizomes easily spread as waters rise and river banks erode, allowing it to take root elsewhere.

Plants other than Japanese knotweed have roots that look a bit similar, though, so check them against the GB non-native species Secretariat (NNSS) identification sheets.

The invasive weed is classed as 'controlled waste' under the Environmental Protection Act 1990, meaning it must be disposed at licensed landfill sites and not within household, compost or green waste schemes. The best way to deal with roots is to destroy them on site by allowing them to dry out before burning.



Celebrating 50 years with Toby Buckland

'Urban Buzz' is an exciting project using innovative techniques to create 840 'Buzzing Hotspots' in England and Wales for our declining pollinators. By transforming mown and unused areas of land, we are creating more than 210 hectares of rich and vibrant habitat (That's over 35 Wembley Stadiums!).

Pollinators are vitally important to landscapes and people but are in serious decline. Urban areas provide enormous opportunities for habitat creation and Urban Buzz is utilising these spaces to help support these remarkable insects.

Moving to the 11th October presentation day in Newquay, our patron Lady Emma Fellowes gave a very personnel and moving tribute to Denise.

On a bright autumn day the 25th October at Haycombe Crematorium in Bath, Denise's funeral took place. Many of my committee attended including me and local "Bloom" groups many wearing flowers. It was a beautiful family orientated service, with many tributes paid including a one from chairman Jon. This he repeated in London the same evening as the day coincided with the National awards presentation, which prevented some members attending. Our condolences go to partner Peter and her family.

On a happier note I turn my attention to our Presentation day at the Grand Atlantic Hotel Newquay on 11th October. It was another fantastic event with over 380 attending. The highlight for many of you I know was the attendance of our Patrons Lord Julian and Lady Emma Fellowes along with Cllr Rachael Craze Mayor of Newquay, who formed the presentation party.

The morning session being taken up with another bumper number of entries in IYNs awards to be presented. Then followed a judging tour of Marlborough with Chairman Jon accompanied by Lady Emma, who thoroughly enjoyed the experience. After a well received buffet lunch, the afternoon saw the usual friendly banter as the main competition results were announced. My congratulations to you all.

The National Britain in Bloom awards held on the 25th October in London saw another good set return to the South West. Gold for Kingsbridge in the Champion of Champions a great achievement for Graham and his team. Golds to Bath and St Just, with Silver Gilts to Newquay, Curry Rival, and Yeovil. Well done everyone, more of the same in 2020

Bleadon Village, North Somerset - Wheatley Trophy Winner Best Re-wilding Entry

Bleadon entered the Bloom competition for the first time this year. The new scoring criterion attracted them as this means that community and environment are almost as important as the actual floral exhibitions. Therefore, as part of the project, participants need to be mindful of the local environment.

The Blue Campaign is a community nature project, started by Fergus Beeley. The idea is that we can each contribute to wild habitats by leaving a piece of our gardens, schools, parks or even road verges and letting it grow wild.



To signify that you are doing that you can put a stake in the ground with a blue heart on it. This tells other people not to cut that area – that area is left to be as nature intended.

Bleadon in Bloom have put Wildflower seeds in many place and particularly along the Rhyne edge. This is to support our Butterflies and Bees.

The first Blue Hearts were made by David Sharman. These have since been accompanied by Blue Hearts made by Children from Lympsham School and Rocks with Blue Hearts on them made by Children from Westhaven School.

A map has been created so that people can walk round a trail to follow them through the village.



New Youth Awards at Newquay Presentation

This was our first year of awarding the title. It was created in memory of Madelaine King-Oakley who was involved in settling up Curry Rivel in Bloom three years ago and who sadly died very suddenly in Oct 2018.

Zac is 11 years old and has his own patch at the allotments in the village which he shares with his parents and brother and sister, he grows runner beans, tomatoes and many other vegetables.

He suppresses weeds and keeps away slugs and snails with sheep's wool that he has collected from nearby fields. He encourages pollinators by growing wild flowers and companion plants. On judging day the judges were invited to taste Elderflower champagne made from flowers from a tree in the allotment and tasted honey from the family beehive.

Zac plays cricket, loves football but always finds time for his gardening where he is very knowledgeable and enthusiastic, with even a Blue Heart area in his allotment.



Plymouth Community Gardeners

Gardening in urban settings can be challenging, but three IYN groups in Plymouth have planted good solutions in diverse locations rebuilt after the blitz.

Residents of West Hoe Flats have worked with Plymouth Community Homes (PCH) to enhance their grounds with



ground floor plantings and floral displays on their balconies. They grow fruit to eat and the garden houses wild bees. Residents feed visiting ducks from across the Tamar. The front lawn has cherry trees and bright floral displays, pride of place is their floral bicycle. PCH organised a planting day in May and the judge was greeted by residents and locals including the PCSO. The garden

is on the route of the City bus tour.

Morley Court Flats (PCH) are in the city centre but a delightful roof garden, above the garages in the centre of the flats, allows the residents to grow ornamentals and edible crops which are picked and distributed to the residents at their monthly meetings. There is a play area, greenhouse and raised beds. The garden hosts visits from city centre schools.


Pembroke EMB in Devonport is celebrating its Silver Jubilee after establishing autonomous management to help improve the run down estate which had many problems 25 years ago. Residents are active in a range of projects to enhance the environment from art, mosaic and most importantly gardening. The residents held a planting day in the Spring and planted up tubs and baskets with bright annuals. Meanwhile staff have a programme to target communal areas for improvement with plants. Some residents have small gardens where a wide range of ornamentals, edibles and herbs are grown. The group had a very successful summer meeting to celebrate the Jubilee, congratulations. Plymouth will host many visitors next year. Can these groups put the Flowers into the Mayflower 400 celebrations?

The steam railway has attractive station plantings to contrast with the natural beauty of the journey along the River Dart. The line is seven miles long, built in 1872, which runs along the stunning valley of the River Dart between Buckfastleigh and Totnes. The steam trains are run by a charity and so attracting tourists to the station with plantings is important.

Staverton Station is the intermediate station on the line. Alison Burgess leads



the group that tend the plantings. The floral displays this year are striking and many reflect the golden jubilee of the line being yellow. The road approach to the station has been replanted with a border of Welsh poppy, lavender and tubs replanted with Nemesia. New raised beds of railway sleepers have been installed on the

platform and planted up with tall perennials including yellow Alcea, Alchillea and contrasting purple lupins which can be seen from the carriages by passengers in transit. Wildlife has been made a feature with a log pile on the platform and, across the permanent way, undisturbed by the public, are bird boxes and feeders, with bored log bug houses. Visitors can eat in the station buffet car, surrounded by baskets and tubs of flowers.



Buckfastleigh Station is the northern terminus and railway materials including engine parts and sleepers for raised beds are incorporated, and reflect the activity of the site. There are a good selection of sustainable perennial and self-seeding plants, with interesting colour contrasts and variety of heights on the platforms, picnic areas, museum, by the miniature railway and around the car park. Plantings led by Nicholas Wakeling are planned to peak during the August period, when visitor numbers were greatest, but have seasonal variations. Sustainable hanging baskets have been planted and a special garden was created for the jubilee.
